Plot	Sophie wants a skateboard for her seventh birthday, but her grandfather gives her an olive tree in Greece instead.
Setting	Sophia's childhood California Greece An immigrant family
Characters	<ul> <li>Sophia, the seven year old protagonist</li> <li>Georgios, her brother</li> <li>Grandfather</li> <li>Mother</li> <li>Papa</li> </ul>
Conflict	Man vs. Man Man vs. Society
Theme	Sophia learns to appreciate the gift of her heritage, to understand her identity and origins.
Literary Devices	Symbolism – the tree itself is a symbol, as Grandfather explains on the first page of the story: "When we left the island, we sold everything," grandfather explained. "But the new owners let us keep the tree. It was a symbolThe olive tree was something of ours that was rooted in Greek earth"  The beads, too, are a symbol of the grandmother and her faith. This is why Grandfather wanted Sophia to travel to Greece to hang them in the tree.

Imagery –

Simile – the sponge seller's sponges are "stacked around him like great lumps of honeycomb...".

Mama leans over the boat toward her homeland "as if she was ready to fly."

The beads are "like liquid gold" and "like big bubbles of honey."

Metaphor – Houses sleep in the Greek sun.

The author uses sensory language to enhance her description: light is described as blue, the suitcase bumps their legs, the straps of the backpack cut Sophie's neck.

Onomatopoeia - sheep "baaed and bleated" to Sophie.
