BIBLIOSCOPIC DIALOGUE: Various children's stories

Read and discuss a group of children's stories selected by your teacher to address the idea of *memory*. On the lines below, summarize the *specific themes* of each title in one sentence each. Your sentences should demonstrate the distinct ways that each title addresses the universal theme.

Wilfrid Gordon McDonald Partridge, by Mem Fox

Young Wilfrid and aging Nancy's cross-generational friendship draws out the universal nature of the human experience and the sensory nature of memory.

Letting Swift River Go, by Jane Yolen

The past, as ephemeral as the blinking fireflies of Sally Jane's memory or the twinkling night sky, cannot be contained or preserved; peace comes from embracing the limitations of creaturehood rather than resisting them.

The Keeping Quilt, by Patricia Polacco

Telling the story of Anna's immigrant mother, who creates a patchwork "keeping quilt" from the clothes of family members back in Russia as a way to remember home, author Patricia Polacco suggests that memories and heritage are worth preserving in tangible, sensory objects.

All the Places to Love, by Patricia Maclachlan

Eli loves the "places" because of their association with the family members he loves; these places house not only family memories, but also family values – the land, an objective symbol of the siblings' rich heritage.
